DEPARTURES.—The magnificent steamship Manhattan left Liverpool for New York on Friday, 21st inst., having on board a company of Saints numbering in all 480 souls, of whom 290 were from Scandinavia, and 190 from Great Britain. The following missionaries returning to Zion were with the company :- Elders Archibald N. Hill, James Ure, Francis Platt, Nathaniel H. Felt, William Gibson, Ephraim T. Williams, Stephen Hales, and Richard R. Birkbeck, who have been laboring in England, and Elders Niels Wilhelmsen, Christian Christiansen, Lars P. Edholm, Andrew Nelson, Hans Hansen, Sören Iversen, Jens Hansen, Frederick C. Sorensen, Gustavus Ohlsson, and Svend Larsen, who have been laboring in Scandinavia. Elders Ure, Platt, and Williams, left their homes in Utah in the spring of 1864, and the others in the spring of 1865. They have had the privilege of bearing testimony of the Lord's great work among the nations of Europe, and are now returning to Zion with the blessings of the Saints and of those who have presided over them. There are none who have more cause for joy and pleasant anticipations, than the faithful Elders of Israel who have accomplished the missions assigned to them with integrity and honor, and have the privilege of rejoining their families, friends, and the Saints in Zion. May God bless his people on the good ship Manhattan, and preserve them on their journey by sea and by land, that they may go up safely to Zion's retreat "in the tops of the mountains," that they may there "learn of his ways and walk in his paths."

All the brethren, whom we thus had the satisfaction of receiving, appeared to enjoy, when they landed, their usual good health and spirits. The rest of the brethren, after receiving their appointments from this Office, were not slow in taking their departures for their various and future fields of labor.

Arrival of Missionaries. – The following Elders from Utah arrived on Saturday morning, Nov, 16th: Hugh Findlay, J.B. Elder, William England, George Batt, Jonas Halverson, C. H. Monson. Andrew Hansen, Magnus Berstrom, Ole Nielson, P. Anderson, Charles Anderson, Jens Hansen, A. P. Rose, Gustave Anderson. The party left Salt Lake City on Oct. 22nd, and arrived in New York on the 27th, where they remained nine days, waiting for the departure of the Guion & Co.'s S.S. Wyoming, on which they crossed the Atlantic, and had a prosperous voyage.

They were met, on the steamer, on arrival in the Mersey, by President Wm. Budge and Elders Nicholson, Nibley, Bunting and B. Rollap. They speak in high terms of the courteous treatment they received from Captain Gadd, Mr. Worrell and others officers of the ship.

The first three Elders named will be assigned to labor in different portions of Great Britain, and Elder Batt, after visiting relatives in Hampshire, for about two weeks, will proceed to New Zealand, in which part he has been called to labor. The remainder left Liverpool at 11:15, Nov. 16th, for Scandinavia, having been called to that Mission.

Those Elders arrived in excellent health and spirits.

Little damage was done, as the ships were of iron, and the flames were speedily extinguished.
